# SPOTLIGHT ON THE VOICE

Did you know you can make music with an instrument you were born with – your voice! The **human voice** is an instrument, and there are so many musical ways to use your voice! Try to make music yourself – you can **speak**, **sing**, **hum**, **or even make noise that imitates percussion**!

Just like you can **take lessons** to learn to play a clarinet, a violin, or a French horn, you can also take **voice lessons**. The singers in today's opera **have been taking voice lessons for years and years**, and practice and study almost every day to continue to learn and grow!

Instruments in an orchestra are grouped into families. There are different names to describe voices, based on a singer's **range.** These names are also called **voice types.** Some people have **high voices**, while others have low voices. In between these types, some people have **medium** voices. In **opera**, singers' vocal ranges are very important and different **characters** have different vocal types. Usually, women characters have a **high female voice**, called a **soprano**, or a **lower female voice**, called a **mezzo-soprano**. Men portrayed in opera also have different vocal types. **High male voices** are called **tenors**, **medium-low voices** are called **baritones**, and the lowest voices heard are **basses**.



## SPOTLIGHT ON OPERA

**Opera** is a **genre** of music. Genres are types of music that are different based on their **musical characteristics**. One very important musical characteristic of an opera is that music is set to a **drama**. Performers sing *and* act. This means that in an opera, performers are **singers** as well as **actors**!

However, operas also have musicians that are not part of the drama on stage. The performers on stage usually sing while an **orchestra** plays music to accompany the sung music. One musical style where the orchestra accompanies a singer is called an **aria**. Arias are long **solos**, which is a piece of music performed by one person. A singer's aria can be accompanied with the orchestra or sung **a capella**, which means that singers perform without the orchestra or accompaniment. When a singer is joined by one other singer during a song, this is called a **duet** or **duo**, and if there are a lot of singers on stage performing, this is called a **chorus**. While you enjoy the opera written by **Rossini** today, called *Cinderella*, see if you can spot when the singers are performing an aria, a duet, or in a chorus.


# **SPOTLIGHT ON ROSSINI**

### **GIOACHINO ROSSINI**



Gioachino Rossini was a famous Italian composer, who was born in 1792. A composer is someone who writes music. Rossini was a composer who wrote many different types of music genres, including operas, cantatas, and symphonies – just to name a few! He grew up in a very

musical family. His father played **horn** and his mother was an **opera singer**! By the time he was 12 years old, Rossini was already singing professionally and by age 14, he had written his first opera! Rossini continued to write music throughout his entire life and had his musical works performed in places like Italy and France.



# **ABOUT THE ARTISTS**

#### DR. JACOB SUSTAITA



Dr. Jacob Sustaita is the assistant conductor of Pacific Symphony. Since 2015, he served as director of orchestral studies at Sam Houston State University where he was responsible for conducting the symphony, chamber, ballet and opera orchestras. In 2016, Sustaita and the orchestra

performed the American premiere of Anton Bruckner's Symphony No. 1(original Linz version) with high praise from the American and European Bruckner Societies.

In 2018 Sustaita was named associate conductor of the Conroe Symphony Orchestra, and in May 2019, he became the orchestra's fourth music director. He is a frequent guest conductor and clinician across the country, and he recently made his debut conducting the Juilliard Orchestra. During the 2016-2017 season, Sustaita made his debut with the BlueWater Chamber Orchestra in Cleveland, Ohio, and made his debut as cover conductor with the Houston Symphony, assisting David Zinman. In 2015, Sustaita was selected by Carnegie Hall's Weill Institute to serve as assistant conductor for Charles Dutoit and the National Youth Orchestra of America. Sustaita regularly conducted and coached the orchestra during its New York residency and on their seven-city tour of China and Hong Kong.

Sustaita's past positions include a three-year tenure as music director of the Minnesota Philharmonic, principal guest conductor for the Cleveland Orchestra Youth Orchestra, a three-year tenure as music director with the Southeast Texas Youth Symphony, and assistant orchestra director at Mayde Creek High School in Katy, Texas.

Music education has always been at the forefront of his conducting interests. He regularly conducts the Link Up Concerts created by Carnegie Hall, and he continues to develop innovative platforms for youth and family concerts that provide a meaningful and exciting experience for all concertgoers. In addition to his responsibilities with the Conroe Symphony Orchestra and Sam Houston State Orchestra, he has conducted youth and collegiate orchestras including the Houston Youth Orchestra Symphony and Philharmonia, Akron Youth Orchestra, Cleveland Orchestra Youth Orchestra and multiple All-Region orchestras. He is also a regular presenter at conventions and for teacher in-service and development workshops.

A native of Texas, Sustaita completed his doctorate degree at the University of Houston, where he served as assistant conductor and guest music director for the Moores Opera Center for three seasons. He holds a Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Houston

and a Master of Music degree from both Penn State and Rice University. His honors include the Schissler Conducting Fellowship, Rice University Prize and Provost Fellowship and American Prize semi-finalist and finalist. His teachers and mentors include Charles Dutoit, Franz Krager, Brett Mitchell, Gerardo Edelstein and Paavo Järvi.

## MICHAEL SEGURA

Dandini



Michael Segura is a Californiaborn baritone and started his artistic journey through stage acting, choir, musical theater, and barbershop. Ultimately, he became a classical musician and opera singer and is now finishing his Bachelor of Music degree at California State University, Fullerton. Segura

portrayed Belcore from *Elixir of Love* with the Pacific Symphony as well as other performance accolades including Don Giovanni in *Don Giovanni* (Mozart), Marco in *Gianni Schicchi* (Puccini) and Des Grieux in *Le Portrait de Manon* (Massenet). Additionally, Michael recently joined Lyric Opera of Orange County as the Winter Fairy in *The Fairy Queen* (Purcell). Along with regional performances, he has won the CSUF Music Associates Concerto/Aria Competition twice as well as the NATS-LA SEP competition

### MARIA CRISTINA NAVARRO

Maria Cristina "Kit" Navarro has performed extensively in Europe, Asia and the United States. She has sung with the Biel, Basel and Baden Theaters, San Diego Opera, LA Opera, Long Beach Opera, El Paso Opera and Opera Pacific. Her guest appearances include the Stadtorchester

Solothurn, Children's Orchestra Society of New York, Pacific Symphony, Pacific Chorale, Kalamazoo Symphony, Filipino-American Symphony Orchestra and many others. Other credits include backup vocals for Reba McEntire and Andrea Bocelli, film soundtracks for *Click* and *Lady in the Water* and west coast concert tour of the *Lord of the Rings* with the Munich Symphony Orchestra. She is currently a student at Cal State Long Beach, earning her credential to be a music teacher, and she is also a member of the music staff at Christ Cathedral in Garden Grove. In March, she will perform in a concert with South Coast Symphony where she will sing opera's greatest arias and duets.

For more than forty years he has performed and directed extensively in opera, oratorio, concert and musical theater throughout the United States and Europe. His operatic and concert credits include performances with the Los Angeles Opera, Seattle Opera, Baltimore Opera, Lyric Opera Cleveland, Wolf Trap Opera, San Francisco Opera Touring Division, Opera Atelier, Cairo Opera, the Opera Estate of Rome and Verona as well as Los Angeles Philharmonic, L'Orchèstre de la Suisse Romande, Basel Chamber Orchestra, Bach Cercle Genève, International Chamber Ensemble Rome, Los Angeles Master Chorale and Orchèstre de Belgique. Dr. Atherton's teaching legacy includes current and former students who have won major international competitions, have been accepted into the most prestigious graduate programs and Young Artist Programs in Europe and the United States, and have performed with major opera companies and symphonies throughout the United States and Europe.

Dr. Kao is currently a professor and a vocal coach at Fullerton College and Chapman University.

Born into a family of professional musicians in London, Rosalind Britton grew up steeped in the arts. After attending the Royal Ballet School, she turned instead to behind-the-scenes work and obtained a bachelor's in theater design. Upon graduation, she worked in costume design

for theater, opera and film, both in London and New York. She lived in Europe several more years before her family moved to California, where she taught art in public schools. After retirement, she became a dedicated volunteer for Pacific Symphony.
