The Great Outdoors brings together the two greatest orchestras in Orange County with a selection of music that was **inspired by nature**. Composers like **Beethoven**, Ravel, Smetana, and Respighi (and many others) often said that it was nature that inspired them the most. It makes me think all that we have around us-beaches, mountains, desert, forests. There is something about the splendor of the outdoors that goes perfectly with the richness and beauty of a symphony orchestra!

Do you have a favorite piece of music that is about nature? I have always loved music about water—whether it's the ocean, the sea, rain, or even a waterfall, and I have always been fascinated with how a composer can take a river or even a sunset and depict that in music. Listen to how Beethoven creates raindrops, lightening, and thunder with the instruments of the orchestra.

Our Spotlight Instruments for this concert are all the brass instruments. Keep a look out for the French horns, trumpets, trombones, and tubas on stage! You can tell who they are because their instruments shine from the metal. With so many brass instruments available, composers can create the most beautiful, noble, or even terrifying sounds. I love when composers have all the brass players play together, it sounds so amazing and huge.

I hope you enjoy our concert today, and you don't want to miss our next concert—Walt Disney Animations Studios: A Decade in Concert, a performance with film clips from some of the latest Disney stories and music performed live by Pacific Symphony.

## ABOUT THE CONDUCTOR

Jacob Sustaita Assistant Conductor for Pacific Symphony, Music Director for Pacific Symphony Youth Orchestra Mary E. Moore Family Assistant Conductor Chair

Dr. Jacob Sustaita serves as the Assistant Conductor for Pacific Symphony and Music Director Carl St.Clair, a position he has held since the fall of 2020. Dr. Sustaita also serves as Music Director and Conductor for Pacific Symphony Youth Orchestra (PSYO), the premier training orchestra of Orange County, recognized as one of the most outstanding youth orchestras in the country.

Dr. Sustaita is the newly appointed Orchestra Director for the Orange County School of the Arts Symphony Orchestra. In the fall of 2021 and 2022, Sustaita served as Acting Director of Orchestras at the Bob Cole Conservatory of Music at California State University Long Beach (CSULB). From 2015-20, he led the Sam Houston State University Symphony, Chamber, Ballet, and Opera Orchestras as Director of Orchestral Studies. In 2016, Sustaita and the Symphony Orchestra performed the

American premiere of Anton Bruckner's Symphony No. 1 (original Linz version) with high praise from the American and European Bruckner Societies.

Dr. Sustaita is a frequent guest conductor and clinician across the country. In 2015, Sustaita was selected by Carnegie Hall's Weill Institute to serve as Assistant Conductor for Charles Dutoit and the National Youth Orchestra of America (NYO). Sustaita regularly conducted and coached the orchestra during its New York residency and on their seven-city tour of China and Hong Kong.

A native of Texas, Sustaita completed his Doctorate and Bachelor of Music degrees at the University of Houston, where he served as Assistant Conductor for the Moores Opera Center for three seasons. He also earned a Master of Music degree from both Penn State University and Rice University.

His honors include: Schissler Conducting Fellowship, Rice University Prize and Provost Fellowship, and American Prize semi-finalist and finalist. His teachers and mentors include Carl St.Clair, Charles Dutoit, Franz Krager, Brett Mitchell, Gerardo Edelstein, and Paavo Järvi.

### ABOUT PACIFIC SYMPHONY YOUTH ORCHESTRA

Founded in 1993, Pacific Symphony Youth Orchestra (PSYO) has emerged as the premier training orchestra of Orange County. Under the artistic direction and guidance of Pacific Symphony's renowned music director, Carl St.Clair, PSYO is quickly being recognized as one of the most outstanding youth orchestras in the country.

Representing over 34 schools in the SoCal region, PYSO offers performance opportunities to instrumentalists in grades 9-12 and is one of four Youth Ensemble programs offered by Pacific Symphony. PSYO provides members with an advanced and innovative artistic experience and strives to encourage musical and personal growth through the art of performance. Each season, students enjoy an interaction with Maestro Carl St. Clair, as well as regular interactions with guest artists and professional musicians of Pacific Symphony. Students also engage in an annual weekend retreat and are offered free and discounted tickets to Pacific Symphony performances throughout the season. PSYO also

enjoys international touring, including to Bulgaria in 2011 and China in 2016, with a July 2023 tour of the Czech Republic and Austria upcoming.

Each season PSYO presents a three-concert series, generously sponsored by individual donors. Members also participate in a side-byside performance with Pacific Symphony, where students perform in concert with their professional counterparts as part of Pacific Symphony's Family Musical Mornings, presented by Farmers & Merchants Bank. All performances take place at the Renée and Henry Segerstrom Concert Hall at the Segerstrom Center for the Arts in Costa Mesa. The final performance of each season features the winner(s) of the annual concerto auditions, for which auditions are exclusive to current PSYO members.

Weekly rehearsals are held at the University of California, Irvine between September and May each season and members are selected through annual auditions each Spring.



### SPOTLIGHT ON THE ARTISTS





Joe Lauderdale has written and directed several Family Musical Mornings concerts including A Sherlock Holmes Halloween, Dinosaurs!, Superheroes, Symphony in Space, Halloween Masquerade, Halloween Goes Hollywood, Video Game Odyssey, and

Nutcracker for Kids!. He also writes and directs for Class Act, Pacific Symphony's elementary school partnership program. Lauderdale was the Youth Theatre Director at the Laguna Playhouse for 17 years where he directed and produced more than 60 productions during his time. He was honored by the American Alliance for Theatre and Education (AATE) with the Youth Theatre Director of the Year Award in 2001. His other writing credits include adaptations of The Summer of the Swans, Alice's Adventures in Wonderland, Tom Sawyer, Cut, as well as the original works Lost Children and Abandoned. For No Square Theatre in Laguna Beach, he has directed such productions as Ruthless, Xanadu, [title of show], The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee, Avenue Q and two Stephen Sondheim shows—A Little Night Music and Into the Woods.



Douglas Nottage is thrilled to be here to inspire a love of the arts in the next generation of children. He fondly recalls sitting in the audience as a much younger child right here at Segerstrom Center for the Arts. Nottage is now a seventh-grade student at The

Orange County School of the Arts. He loves musicals and has been in many productions. Some favorites include playing Oliver Twist in *Oliver!* at Irvine Valley College, Winthrop in *The Music Man* at San Clemente High School, and he is excited about his upcoming role in *The Lightning Thief* at The Laguna Playhouse. Nottage has also received many awards for his classical piano playing and composing skills, and in his limited spare time, he plays baseball and participate in math and robotics competitions. Nottage deeply appreciates the time, expertise, and care all the directors, performers, crew, and guests have devoted to *The Great Outdoors!*

Juliet Fischer was as most recently seen singing and dancing in the Netflix movie *The Prom* opposite Meryl Streep and James Corden. She performed her one woman show *My Midlife Cabaret* at Sterlings Upstairs in Los Angeles, after

finishing a sold-out run in Laguna. Her credits include the Broadway and Touring shows of *Chicago, On the Town, A Christmas Carol, Kiss Me Kate,* and *My Favorite Broadway* at Carnegie Hall. ### SPOTLIGHT ON THE COMPOSERS





Modest Mussorgsky was a Romantic composer who was part of a group of composers called "The Five" who developed a national style of Russian music in the 19th century. Mussorgsky was born in Karevo, Russia on March 21, 1839 and began playing

piano when he was six years old and then published a piano piece when he was 12 years old! His compositions used history and folklore as well as national themes from his native homeland. He would eventually join the military, but never gave up music and would play for his fellow-cadets at dances in addition to taking music lessons. He would continue to compose music throughout his life, writing operas, tone poems, and piano suites. In addition to his music being performed around the world by **orchestras**, Mussorgsky's music would also be used in popular culture! His tone poem Night on Bald Mountain was used in Disney's feature film Fantasia. Both progressive rock band Emerson, Lake & Palmer and Michael Jackson would use music from Mussorgsky's Pictures at an Exhibition!



Ludwig Van Beethoven was a famous **composer**, someone who writes music. He was born on December 17, 1770 in Germany and became one of the most famous composers ever! Beethoven wrote music primarily in the Classical and Romantic eras of music and

continued to write music even though he started to lose his hearing. Though Beethoven could hear well when he was younger, he became deaf later in his life. He was able to "hear" his pieces by removing the legs of the piano and feeling the vibration the piano made on the floor when he played.



Joseph Maurice Ravel was a French Impressionist composer, born on March 7, 1875. He is recognized as one of the greatest French composers of all time. He was a pianist and composer, but he is well-known for his orchestration. He would often

write pieces of music specifically for piano, then create an orchestral arrangement for that piece so an entire orchestra could play his music! In addition to being a great composer of repertoire for piano, chamber music, piano concertos, ballet music, operas, and song cycles, he was also among the first composers to be involved with the audio recordings of his own music! Ravel helped supervise recordings of classical music, so we can listen to these sounds today!

### SPOTLIGHT ON BRASS




If you have ever seen a trumpet, French horn, trombone, or tuba and thought they look related, you would be right-they're in the same instrument family! The brass family includes instruments that make sound when a musician buzzes their lips into a mouthpiece.

When a musician plays a brass instrument, the air goes through a long, narrow tube with a bell-shaped end to make the sound you hear. Brass players can change the notes they play by pushing valves, or buttons, to make notes higher or lower. They can also change notes by adjusting their embouchure or how they shape their lips.


Brass instruments are popular in many different types of ensembles aside from the orchestra—including Mexican bandas, jazz ensembles, and marching bands. These groups might use brass instruments like the euphonium, the flugelhorn, or the sousaphone that you wouldn't normally see in an orchestra!




### FLOWER MAZE
